



Engagement Strategies

- Community-based Lunch & Learn/ Coffee Chats about the levels of government and what each level is responsible for. We do these where people are naturally gathering or through existing programs
- Meet & Greet with candidates/elected officials in different communities
- Mock Polling Stations (showing people how to vote) providing facts. handouts, choice of candidates and main issues
- Helping people register to vote (using postal codes) and find polling station
- Organize All Candidate Debates at a CHC/ CHRC

Engagement Strategies...cont'd

- Set up information tables in apartment buildings or in Community Houses for several weeks leading up to an election
- Provide information at events (partner agencies, Food Trucks, and community BBQs)
- Door-to-Door Outreach (including resident leaders)
- Public education around who does what, how to write to representatives
- Community Conversations in natural/ ongoing ways where people gather
- Deputation training, how to present at budget consultations
- Engage local community leaders from various faith, language groups

Where we have found support:

- Democratic Knowledge Exchange (engagement and readiness tools, workshops for residents, mock polling stations, fantastic literature and handouts)
- Elections Ontario
- ▶ Elections Canada (Inspire Democracy program, Train-the-Trainer, outreach materials)

- Alliance for Healthier Communities (pre-budget recommendations, advocacy material, templates
- Our sister CHCs and CHRCs
- Community Associations and All Candidates Debate
- Community Partners such as Aging in Place, Community legal services Ottawa participate in various organizations

Key Challenges for Community Developers

- Often off side of our desks, not integrated into workplans year-round, only at election time
- Low resource allocation in terms of human resources, budgets to do this work in an ongoing way
- Lack of knowledge or training for staff about levels of government and electoral processes
- As our crisis work increases, our capacity for proactively engaging in civic engagement work becomes less of a priority

Barriers to Civic Engagement and/or voting

- Accessibility(transportation)
- Language barriers
- Lack of interest in resident-led leadership/advocacy due to lack of incentives that we can offer
- Minimum awareness around voting, election processes
- Apathy. Why bother? What difference will my vote make?
- Distrust in the electoral system, sometimes cultural/ historical
- Time constraints and long wait times

Recommendations/Way Forward

- ► Go to where People Are! Regularly.
- Engagement via Social Media and Digital Platforms: Encourage local governments and organizations to share regular updates on platforms people are already using, like Instagram, Facebook, and even TikTok, to make civic content engaging and accessible.
- Youth Engagement and Inclusion Initiatives: Engage young people through internships, mentorships, or school programs to cultivate a habit of civic engagement early on.
- Accessible Voting Resources and Registration Drives: Develop ongoing voter registration and education drives, especially in under-represented communities.
- Ongoing Feedback Loops with Elected Officials: Encourage elected officials to create regular feedback loops with constituents through surveys, newsletters, or quarterly reports that outline the progress on key issues.
- Provision of transportation for each riding



She was born and raised in a rural community of Northern Iran where she learned the importance of collective efforts in facing common challenges. Eshrat's journey for community development and her passion for helping others grew while living in Iran, New Zealand and Canada. She has always been a strong advocate of human rights, food and health equity, public participation, democracy, and civic engagement.

Eshrat is an experienced leader in mobilizing community resources, creating synergy and providing social support to those in need, people with family crisis, particularly newcomers facing resettlement challenges. She has played major role in local consultations, projects and programs related to community health such as managing Covid-19 challenges and vaccination campaign during the pandemic, emergency food distribution, health equity and food security research, cancer screening, improving community's physical and mental health challenges, and Seniors' Support program.

In addition, Eshrat has facilitated many training workshops since 2019 for educating community and promoting healthy and cost-effective food preparation through collaboration with Flemingdon Health Center, Oriole Community Centre, Scarborough Centre for Healthy Communities, and Access Alliance in Toronto.

She has been recognized for her community activities and achievements throughout the years for her leadership in the community. Eshrat is also a member of Local Champions' Network in Toronto.

Her current portfolio includes, community outreach and engagement, health access, sustainable initiatives, food security, community ambassadors, community capacity building and special projects. 
